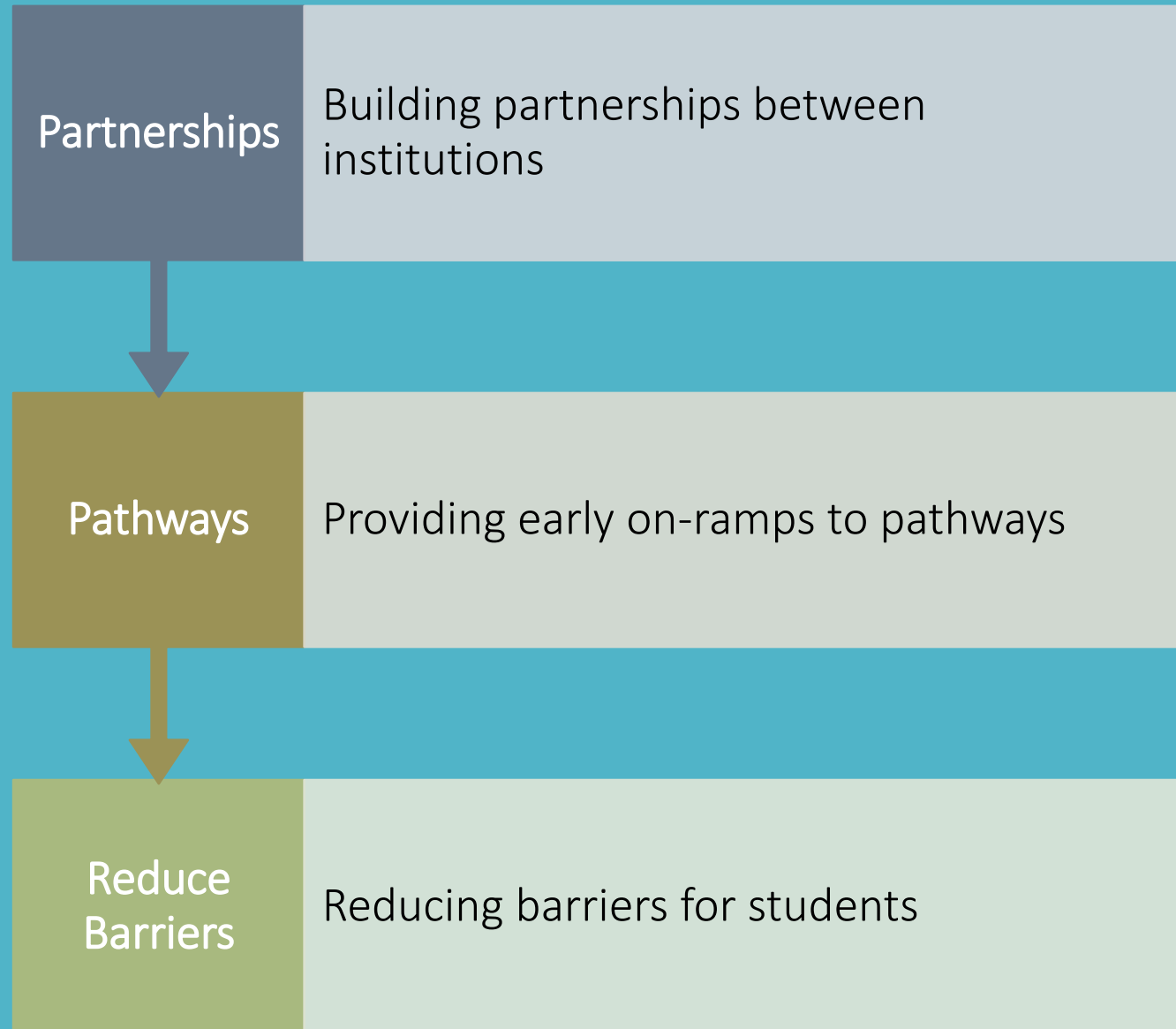



# On-ramps to Pathways: Dual Enrollment/College & Career Access Pathways (CCAP)

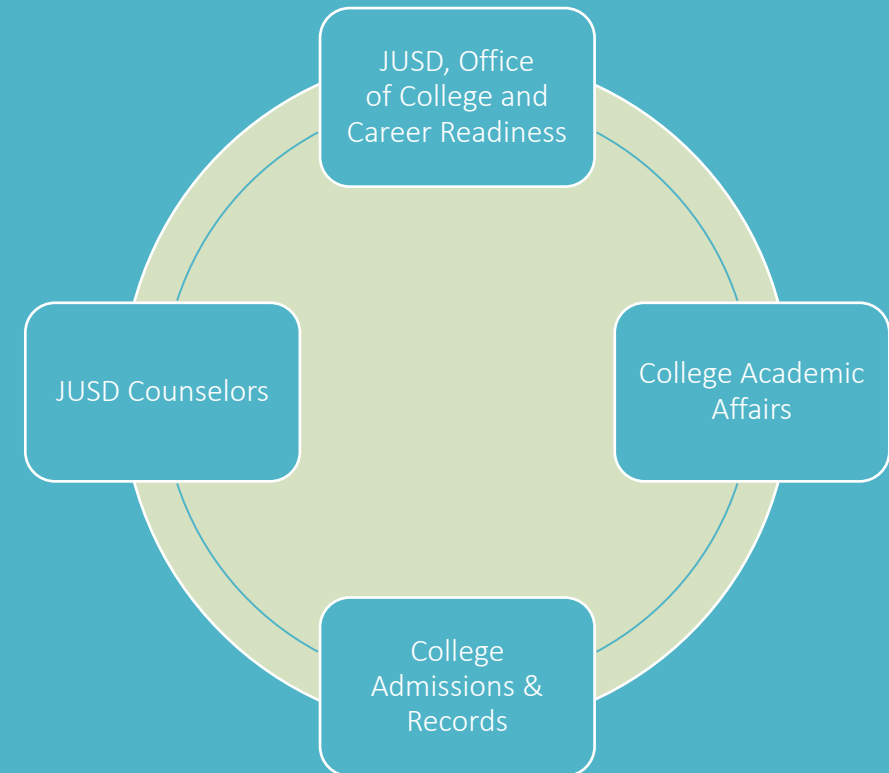
## Purpose

Expanding dual enrollment for students who may not already be college bound or who are underrepresented in higher education

## Goals

- Provide seamless pathways to community college CTE and transfer
- Improve high school graduation rates
- Improve college and career readiness

Requires consistent and effective coordination between all institutions

- Educational advising

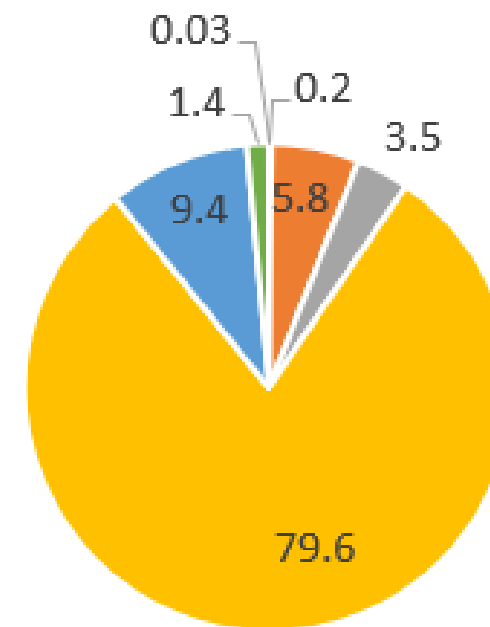
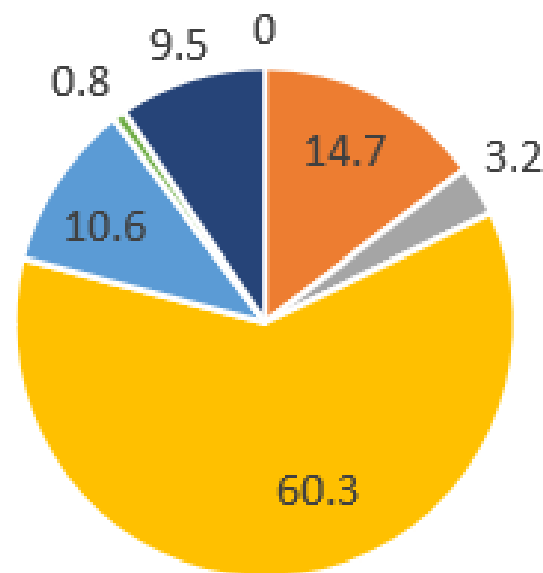

# Reducing Barriers: Promise Programs

NC and RCC's Promise Programs are designed to help first-time college students complete their educational goals in a timely manner.

Students who commit to the Promise Program receive financial support during their first year to reduce college costs and increase their success.



# Reducing Barriers: Upward Bound (UB)

Secondary-School Retention  
and Graduation - Persistence:  
100%

Post-secondary enrollment  
rate: 90%

AA or BA 6-year completion  
rate: 53%
